- You are doing well in physics and you would love to learn new ways of explaining concepts and doing problems.

We are looking for people who:

- Are interested in fostering and promoting the values of diversity and inclusion.
- Have had a college-level introductory physics course at UW-Madison or elsewhere (e.g., 104, 208, 202, 248).

- I better understand how students learn physics, and how to facilitate active, peer to peer learning.
- A real sense of community and support from the staff, other PMTs, and students.
